


HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONAL OF THE YEAR

Toinetta Coolie, DNP, APRN, FNP-BC, is the Heart Optimization Clinic manager at Baptist Heart & Vascular Institute. Under her management, the HOC team has grown, hospital readmission rates have fallen and outreach services and locations have expanded to increase access to care and reduce COVID-19 exposure to patients.



PHYSICIAN OF THE YEAR

Enrique Diaz, M.D., specializes in the management of interstitial lung diseases, pulmonary hypertension, lung transplantation and advanced lung diseases. He helped develop the ECMO program at Baptist Hospital, and in 2017, Baptist was the first in Northwest Florida to offer ECMO for adult patients who have life-threatening breathing and/or heart problems. During the height of COVID-19, Dr. Diaz was instrumental in saving countless lives using ECMO in the ICU to care for Baptist's most vulnerable patients.



CASINO ROYALE

This elegant black-tie event brings together Baptist leaders and vendors for a night of first-class dining, dancing, charity auctions and charitable gaming. Each year, Casino Royale is inspired by a James Bond movie, with this year's event featuring themes from "Dr. No." The 8th annual Casino Royale Gala took place on April 8, 2022, and raised nearly **\$300,000**. Proceeds benefitted the **new Baptist Hospital campus** at Brent Lane and I-110.

This new 57-acre, centrally-located campus is designed to be a calm, peaceful, patient-centered environment of care for those we serve. An innovative, convenient, safe and compassionate place to provide and receive care, the new campus will incorporate modern efficiencies in a healing environment.

The new campus, opening in fall 2023, includes a full-service, 10-floor, 602,000-square-foot flagship hospital, behavioral health unit and the six-floor, 178,000-square-foot Bear Family Foundation Health Center. These buildings are complemented by the natural beauty of the town square, designed to provide an activated outdoor space for rest, healing, fellowship and wellness.



HELPING HANDS TEAM MEMBER GIVING



Baptist Health Care team members are some of the most generous donors to the Foundation, contributing **\$177,173** last year. Donations to the Helping Hands Fund financially impact three focus areas: assisting team members and their families directly, giving back to our communities and supporting our organizational Mission of helping people throughout life's journey.

TEAM MEMBER IMPACT

- **Emergency Assistance** – \$48,580 total financial assistance was provided to 37 team members to support them through catastrophic events.
- **Educational Scholarships** – 36 educational scholarships were awarded to team members and dependents in the amount of \$1,000 each.
- **Holiday Food Assistance** – 36 team members received food card assistance.
- **Adoption/Foster Care Assistance** – Three team members received one-time \$1,000 adoption assistance.

COMMUNITY IMPACT

- **C.A. Weis Elementary School** – 550 students received Christmas gifts.
- **United Way of West Florida** – A \$25,000 donation impacted 56 partner agencies and 29 funded programs.
- **Mission Trip Support** – Three team members received assistance to support mission trip efforts.

ORGANIZATIONAL SUPPORT

- **Mini-Grants Program** – 16 grants were awarded to departments organization-wide for a total impact of \$61,220.


An Adoption Story

“On Sept. 3, 2020, we were matched with 5-year-old Janae. She moved in Oct. 1, 2020, and we finalized her adoption on Oct. 4, 2021. After struggling with years of infertility, we were open to other ways of growing our family. Every day at work I would walk by the pictures of children waiting to be adopted hanging on the wall in the corridor from the towers to the hospital. I shared the strong pull my heart felt with my husband, and we agreed to proceed down the path of adoption.

We worked with FamiliesFirst Network with hopes to help kids in our immediate community. Our journey to adoption took approximately one year, which allowed us to really see what our family would look like. Adoption is both rewarding and challenging, but in the end worth all the ups and downs. We have so much fun together as a family, enjoying traveling, sports, outdoor adventures and spending time on the water. Even though we missed the early years, we cherish every “first” we are able to experience together.

Jason and I were able to fulfill our desire to grow our family, and Janae was able to find her forever home. We appreciate the support of the Helping Hands program and the Baptist Health Care Foundation through this process.”

MISSION TRIP IMPACT

Through Helping Hands, aid or supplies for domestic or foreign mission trips can be provided to help further support a team member's mission or ministry outreach.

Hannah Yager, marketing manager for Baptist, visited Peru in July 2022 with the Reimagine mission team. Over 10 days, Hannah and the mission team replaced five thatched and cardboard dwellings with wooden homes and gave away free clothing to hundreds of community members.

Hannah worked in a couple of small communities outside of the capital city of Lima. The region is mountainous, and many residents must climb hundreds of stairs daily to reach their homes at the top of the mountain.

The same applies when the mission team constructs a new home. Trucks hauling building materials can only make it so far up the mountain on the steep dirt roads. After the truck has taken supplies as high as possible, the mission team and residents of the community make a long assembly line up the stairs to the building site. They pass the pieces of the prefabricated home – walls, doors, bags of sand for the foundation – up the mountain for hours while a contracted construction team assembles the home at the build site.

“Building each home is a big job,” Hannah said. “We couldn’t do it with our small team of 20, so the whole community pitches in. It’s beautiful to see. Many people who are in need themselves pitch in to help build a house for another family.” Community members who help with the build receive a voucher for a free meal each day and a voucher to choose free clothing at the end of the week.

The region of San Juan de Lurigancho is one of Lima’s largest and poorest districts. Because the Reimagine team has been building homes in the same community for so many years, the people know and trust the teams. But, Reimagine does more than simply build houses. They have a weekly kids’ program where they worship, study the Bible and do crafts and activities. There is also a church that meets all year long, ministering to and disciplining new believers.

This was the first trip for Hannah with Reimagine, but it won’t be her last. She said that her experiences there truly blessed her compassionate heart and connection to God just as much as she touched the lives of the Peruvian community.

“Before I even left Peru, I had already decided to go back next year,” said Hannah. “I believe in my heart that more of God’s work can be done there, and I want to directly contribute physically and spiritually with these wonderful people. I am grateful to the Baptist Health Care Foundation who donated funds to help with purchasing supplies on this trip. Baptist truly cares about helping people throughout life’s journey in our community and far beyond.”

MAMMOGRAM FUND

Every October, the Foundation partners with Baptist Cancer Institute and the imaging department for a month-long campaign to raise awareness about the importance of breast health. The Foundation's Mammogram Fund provides mammograms year-round to those in need in our communities.

Throughout the year, the Foundation continuously works with community partners and donors to help raise funds and awareness about Baptist's mammogram program. This program would not be possible without the generous support of our donors who contributed **\$99,203** this year.

Over the last 13 years of this program, screenings have been provided to **2,645** people. As a result of these screenings, **681** required additional testing, **93** required biopsies and **32** were diagnosed with breast cancer.

DONOR SPOTLIGHT

Pensacola Breast Cancer Association

The Pensacola Breast Cancer Association (PBCA) is a local 501(c)3 nonprofit organization established in 2003 whose volunteer board members are a dedicated group that is passionate about serving those in need in our community. PBCA's Mission is to raise money for education, screening and diagnosis of breast cancer in the Florida Panhandle indigent and under-insured patient population.

The Foundation serves as one of PCBA's community partners that receives annual funding to provide mammogram screenings to those in need. Over the last **15 years**, as of FY 2021, PCBA has donated a total of **\$293,000** to our Mammogram Fund.



The Foundation was the recipient of **University of West Florida's "Pack-It-Pink" ladies' volleyball** match in October 2021. The annual event was co-sponsored by Andrews Institute and the Baptist Cancer Institute to raise awareness about breast cancer resources. A portion of the event proceeds was donated to our Mammogram Fund.

WOMEN'S BOARD OF BAPTIST HEALTH CARE FOUNDATION

Established in 1976, the Women's Board of Baptist Health Care Foundation provides consistent support for the community through its commitment to health care initiatives. The Women's Board has raised more than **\$3.5 million** in support of various health care programs at Baptist. Through their efforts, the Women's Board volunteers have helped our organization make a difference in the lives of thousands in our community, ensuring that access to the very best in health care and human services is available to all.

Membership for the Women's Board is open to any woman who is interested in serving her community. Membership meetings are held quarterly and provide members an opportunity to meet new friends, get the latest news from Baptist and learn through fun and educational programs. In addition to the quarterly meetings, the board hosts Women's Night Out events to engage its membership.

STEPPING OUT IN STYLE 45TH ANNUAL FASHION SHOW

The 45th annual Stepping Out in Style Fashion Show, presented by the Women’s Board of Baptist Health Care Foundation, raised more than **\$120,000** to name the **infant nursery** at the new Baptist Hospital campus at Brent Lane and I-110.

The fashion show is the largest fundraiser for the Women’s Board. The event was held on Oct. 28, 2021, at Sanders Beach Corrine-Jones Resource Center and featured professional and local models showcasing the latest fashions along the runway, silent and live auctions, and emcees Brent Lane and Sue Straughn. The show featured styles from local boutiques including Bluetique, Dillard’s, Gulf Coast cabi Stylists, The Market and Mainly Shoes, and The South Outfitters.



HOSPITAL PROJECTS SUPPORTED

Heart & Vascular Institute Heart Optimization Clinic

Heart failure is estimated to affect 4 to 5 million Americans, with 550,000 new cases reported annually.

At Baptist, our Heart Optimization Program can assess each patient's unique medical needs and goals. The goals are immediately available to the heart optimization clinic provider, the cardiologist and the primary care provider within the Baptist Health Care system. The ability to share this information between providers ensures that patients receive the best possible care.

The Foundation purchased an **Abbott Piccolo Xpress Analyzer** and testing supplies for the heart failure clinic and cardiology research department. This equipment will allow the clinical team to perform a simple venipuncture to obtain the needed labs to determine the proper medication dosages for each patient before they even leave the office. The goal is to prevent heart problems through medication, leading to fewer hospitalizations. Our research team can provide accurate lab results to our providers within minutes, assisting with the outcome of current research projects. The overall goal is to continue helping people throughout life's journey with improved communication, timely lab monitoring and increasingly positive outcomes – all of which will assist with decreasing our overall heart failure hospital readmissions.



Lung Simulator for Respiratory Services

The Foundation purchased the **Dual Adult Lung Simulator** to assist in training for complicated conditions that occur in the ICU and ER. The simulator allows for the learner to respond to changing conditions, troubleshoot and manage the ventilator while being observed by the instructor. A debriefing will then take place post simulation to discuss behaviors, actions and learning opportunities. The device is portable and can be safely transported to the respiratory services teams at all Baptist hospitals. This type of team training improves individual and team performance as well as patient outcomes. It enables improvement in behaviors during time critical events and provides hands-on interaction to address learning needs before a clinician works with a patient.
